#### Oshwal Directory Update

The Oshwal Directory that lists Oshwals residing in the USA and Canada was published in June 2000. At that time we had listed 209 families in the USA and 107 families in Canada. Our continuously updated database lists 234 families in the USA. We plan to publish a new directory by June 2004. In the mean time, we are providing below a short listing of new members and changes in address and telephone number of existing members. We will provide a copy of the directory to all new members free.

#### A Brief History of the Halari Visa Oshwals

The Halari Visa Oshwal community is a very small community. At the beginning of this century, the population was between 10 and 12 thousand. By 1972, it had increased to 45 thousand, and at present it is probably between 50 and 55 thousand, almost equally divided between India, Kenya, and England, with approximately 2,000 members in North America (USA and Canada). The latest migration has been to Australia.

What follows is a historical resume of the Oshwal community. More detailed information on our heritage is available from our elders. The origin of the name "Oshwal" is probably tied to a small village in the Indian State of Rajesthan named Ossiya. At the site of Ossiya, once there was a large city there. The ancient names by which this city was known at various time were Uplesh Pattan, Urkesh, Melpur Pattan and Navmeri.

According to an Uplesh publication written in 14th Century, Shree Ratna Prabhu Shvarji, the 7th Acharya in the line of Shree Parshvanath's sect, came here with his five hundred disciples in year 70 after Mahavira Nirvana. The city at that time was ruled by King Upaldev and his very able minister Uhad. After receiving proper guidance from Acharya, the King, his minister and more than thousand Rajput soldiers gave up alcohol and meat and adopted Jainism. The Acharya gave this group the name Oshwals. Thus, a new Jain sect of Oshwal Gaccha, the ancestors of the Oshwal community, came into existence.

However, according to another publication "Ossiya Vir Stavan" written in 1721 by Naya Pramod, a disciple of Hir Udya, the city of Ossiya was founded in 1011 and the conversion by Acharya took place in 1017. But in the historical documents published in the city of Bhinmal, it is mentioned that Minister Uhad left Bhinmal and founded the city in year 70 after Mahavira Nirvana. Also, in the documents available from city of Korta there is a mention of a conversion of a large group to Jainism by Acharya Shree Ratna Prabhu Suri Shvarji in Ossiya in the year 70 after Mahavira Nirvana.

Therefore, from the several historical accounts, it appears that the Oshwal Gaccha was established in the year 70 after Mahavira Nirvana by Acharya Shree Ratna Prabhu Suri Shvarji, a leader of lord Parshvanath's sect.

Around 10th or 12th century AD, because of adverse natural conditions, a small number of these Oshwal Mahajans left the village of Ossiya in search of better life and migrated to Sindh; what now is called West Pakistan. The conditions in Sindh were not any better. So, the group continued the migration southwards into Kutch, now a part of the State of Gujarat and settled in Vagad district. Later on, some moved to Kanthi district.

Around 1535, a small group of Oshwals of Vagad District suddenly left Kutch and moved to Saurashtra. As usual, there are two stories as to why this happened... One real story, and the other fictional.

Rebuild Hope - At the November Oshwal gathering, we shared plans for our Project Rebuid-Hope -- the effort to rebuild an all-girls high school in Anjar, as the school is unusable following the January 2001 earthquake. Following is progress made since our November meeting.

First, the website was launched. You can go to www.rebuildhope.org for more details on the project. It will be our forum to facilitate communication and updates between donors, volunteers, the school, and the Indian management and construction team.

Second, we are in the process of finalizing an arrangement with CRY Inc., a US based non-profit which has been donating over \$1 million annually to help children in India since the mid-1980's. Provided we complete the arrangement, CRY Inc. will extend its non-profit status to RebuildHope.

Third, we have identified a reputable construction partner based in Gujarat. The company has given us a detailed construction estimate for the project. A "fully loaded" school will cost about \$130,000, a number less than our original ballpark estimate at \$200,000.

Fourth, we have begun to build out a leadership team. Our Leadership committee is 4 members, and we have a number of volunteers.

Our next steps include the following:

- 1. Finalize agreement with CRY Inc.
- 2. Recruit additional volunteers for fundraising.
- 3. Begin fundraising.

As part of the above next steps we are doing the following:


- 1. Raising money from young Indian professionals at leading companies.
- Working with Boston-area Indian students for RebuildHope to be the focus Charity for upcoming cultural events.
- 3. Securing a recognizable Indian business leader to serve as a sponsor for our efforts.

If all goes well with this school project, we will have the infrastructure to make this an on-going effort. Our vision is to make RebuildHope the leading non-profit for 1st generation Indian-Americans to give back to our mother country. As such, we are also working to attain non-profit status for our organization, outside of our partnership with CRY Inc.

The effort is good. Momentum is building. We are looking for people who want to make a difference and people who want to do something good for future generations of Indians. If that describes you, then you should get involved with RebuildHope.
